Director's Note

Creating theatre right now is an act of artistic rebellion. Attending theatre is an act of rebellion too. The dominant opinion is that theatre is defined by its liveness; by audience and artists assembling in a shared physical space. But when live assembly becomes impossible, how we respond as storytellers is crucial. Theatre people—creators and audiences alike— are tenacious, and it has inspired me to witness the many ways that we have all adapted over the last year.

When we began in September, our mission was to find a play that would satisfy a myriad of complex criteria: It was crucial that the play provide a great opportunity for these students to learn about acting. It had to be a true ensemble piece. We were also determined to select a play that would benefit from being reimagined for a digital platform; something that would excite the imaginations of our brilliant design team. And we wanted to tell a story that would bring people joy.

We spent the first two months of class experimenting with a variety of possibilities. After much discussion, we arrived at the double bill of William Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and Rosamund Small's *TomorrowLove*: We would call the project *TomorrowLove and the Digital Dream*, and we would dive deep into an exploration of both classical and contemporary acting.

I've always been fascinated by Titania's monologue in Act 2 Scene 1. In this monologue, she communicates to Oberon that their battle over the changeling child is causing global disasters, climate change, and contagious diseases. This resonated with me powerfully when I revisited the text in the fall. Titania entreats Oberon to give up the fight so that universal harmony can be restored. The cosmic stakes of this proposition thrilled me. I've always longed for a production of Dream to dig into the world that Titania describes: the universal mayhem that is a biproduct of the strife between the king and queen of the fairies.

Titania's quest to re-establish harmony became the launching point for our exploration of this play. We built a world in chaos. A dangerous, disease-riddled Republic of Athens; an Athens

shackled by archaic power structures and harmful patriarchal laws. An Athens in desperate need of profound and permanent transformation. This pursuit of positive transformation is at the core of our interpretation of *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and has been a touchstone for us throughout our study of acting in this class. We work to "fight for the light;" to maintain hope against great odds. This is what brings a scene to life.

It has been an honour to collaborate with this talented ensemble; and it has been a tremendous joy to build this play—on this unfamiliar platform— with these superb designers and technicians. We would like to extend our gratitude to the faculty, staff, and students of the CDTPS and to the huge, beautiful, imaginative team of collaborators who have brought this play so brilliantly to life.

Moyukh Syeed - Lysander



Dylan Trowbridge is a Toronto-based actor, director and teacher. He began his career at the Shaw Festival, where he played the title role in Christopher Newton's production of *Peter Pan*. Other Shaw Festival credits include leading roles in *The Lord of the Flies*, *The Matchmaker*, *Widowers' Houses*, *The*

Coronation Voyage and Rutherford and Son. Dylan made his West End debut in 2009, playing Neil Kellerman in Dirty Dancing at London's Aldwych Theatre. He also spent two seasons at the Stratford Festival, appearing in Mary Stuart, Measure for Measure, Titus Andronicus and The Grapes of Wrath. Additional theatre credits include: Tribes, Julius Caesar (Canadian Stage), Taking Care of Baby (Critics Pick Award for Best Supporting Actor), the English language premier of Wajdi Mouawad's Tideline (Factory Theatre) and Tiny Dynamite (Theatre Smash).

Dylan is a founding member of Theatrefront, with whom he cowrote and performed in *Return (The Sarajevo Project)*, earning a Dora nomination for best new play. Film and television credits include *The Handmaid's Tale*, *Anne with an E, V Wars, Impulse, American Hangman, Dark Matter, Private Eyes, Alias Grace, Orphan Black, Bomb Girls* and *Hemlock Grove*.

As a director, Dylan's productions of *The Harrowing of Brimstone McReedy* and *Space Opera Zero!* for Toronto's Eldritch Theatre have earned multiple Dora nominations and one win. Other recent directing credits include *Herringbone and The Yalta Game* (Talk is Free Theatre) and *Every Brilliant Thing* starring Gavin Crawford (Festival Players).

Dylan is the Artistic Associate of Theatrefront, the Associate Artistic Director of The Festival Players of Prince Edward County,

and the Co-Founder/Co-Creative director of GhostLight, Canada's online platform for mentorship in the theatre (ghostlight.ca).

Graham Abbey - Director & DRM 403 Course Instructor
