


Angelli McGuigan – Set & Lighting Design

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Director's Note

"Do something, say something, anything, fight." – Braidie, *The Shape of a Girl.*

These words have been echoing through my head for the past seven months that I have been working with this script, and their reverberations have brought forth the show you are about to watch. The Shape of a Girl is truly a script that fell into my lap in the right place at the right time. In a summer filled with turbulence — a global pandemic, a civil rights movement and outrage at the powers that be — this script held me in an equilibrium of self-reflection. Whether we sit back and watch in horror or stand up and fight is a choice we all must make, and that fight is at the core of The Shape of a Girl.

Specifically, with this production I aimed to explore time and memory as a means to accountability. How do we reshape our biases and recollections to hold ourselves accountable to times when we were ignorant? How can we reframe the narrative to see truth in our pasts? And how do we find the courage to stop sitting idly and stand up for lasting change in our communities?

I'd like to thank everyone who has made the creation of this production possible. Seven months ago, I never would have thought I would have directed, shot and edited my first feature length film in the midst of a global pandemic. But I could not be more grateful for the experience. Through the ups and the downs, the creation of this show has been an adventure I will forever cherish. To my entire creative team — who froze with me out on a beach in Pickering in the cold November mornings — I couldn't have picked a more talented and wonderful group of human beings. To my voice cast — some of whom I've never met in person — thank you for lending your voices and your stories. To Hannah, my star, thank you for your dedication, your grit and your light. And to the entire staff at the CDTPS, thank you for supporting me along this entire, extremely unconventional journey.

Finally, I would like to dedicate this show in the memory of Reena Virk, for whom this show is written, and Keshav Mayya, a first-year student at U of T who recently took his life. Theatre has always acted as a site for community healing and I hope that the University of Toronto community can come together to heal, and to demand better from the powers that be — to improve mental health services on campus, to revamp health and wellness and accessibility services and to support students in times of need. And to you, if you are still reading this, you are loved. Check in with your friends today and let them know how loved they are too. It might just make their day.


Cast Biographies

CDTPS Instructors



Baņuta Rubess – Instructor, Advanced Directing

Dr. Banuta Rubess is a director and writer with a string of innovative productions to her credit for audiences in Europe and Canada. One of the first batch of women to win the Rhodes Scholarship, she has a doctorate in history from Oxford University. Most recently she received an MFA in Creative Writing from the University of Guelph.

She created ground-breaking works for Nightwood Theatre, Theatre Direct, and Tapestry New Opera Works, and was Associate Artist at Theatre Passe Muraille. Significant productions include: *This is for you, Anna; Goodnight, Desdemona; Boom, Baby, Boom; Nigredo Hotel; The Stillborn Lover; Pope Joan; Thin Ice.*

Banuta works in two languages. She directed her first show in Riga as the Soviet Union crumbled, winning the Latvian Critics' Award. In 1998, she moved to Latvia. Her productions ranged from plays by Caryl Churchill, Samuel Beckett and John Mighton, to an immersive version of *La Ronde* and a production performed on a beach. She won a Best Direction Award for her interpretation of *An Ideal Husband*. Her production of a children's opera has been running at the Latvian National Opera since 2002.

She returned to Canada permanently in 2012. Since then, she showcased a verbatim production about love and a chamber opera about the garment industry. She recently completed a novel about her father, yoga, and World War II, and has been writing for a Latvian TV series.

She teaches performance, devising, directing and Canadian theatre history at the Centre for Drama, Theatre, and Performance Studies.



Janice Fraser – Instructor, Advanced Production & Production Manager

Janice is a proud alumna of the CDTPS, graduating with a double major in drama and English. Over her 20+ year career in lighting, Janice has had the pleasure of working at world-class venues such as the Banff Centre for the Arts, the Canadian Broadcast Corporation, and as the Head

Electrician at the Four Seasons Centre for the Performing Arts. Her more recent work includes a build of a brand new arena tour for Cirque du Soleil called *Messi10*, as the Interim Head of Lighting and Video. She is a proud member of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (IATSE Local 58), and also teaches at the National Theatre School in Montreal. Janice is very proud of all of the CDTPS students who have put so much hard work into this year's Directors' Showcase.



Snezana Pesic – Instructor, Advanced Design

Snezana is Serbian Canadian scenographer and design educator.

Her work has been seen across Canada within companies such as Banff Centre, The Confederation Centre of the Arts, Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre, Theatre New Brunswick, Against the Grain Theatre, Ghost

River Theatre, Obsidian Theatre, Odyssey Theatre, Native Earth and Cahoots Theatre, among others.

Pesic is recipient of Betty Mitchell Award, as well as Prix Rideau Award and Pauline McGibbon Award nominee. With her work, she participated in numerous international exhibitions, including Prague Quadrennial (2007, 2015) and World Stage Design (Seoul 2009, Cardiff 2013). Snezana curated and designed the Canadian National Exhibition, *Individuality and Interconnection*, at the Prague Quadrennial 2019 (PQ2019). Under her leadership, the Canadian National Exhibition was honoured with the PQ2019 Award for Excellence in Performance Design, recognizing the work of exhibit designer, Michael Levine.
